



Response to recent surveys

Dear Parents and Carers,

First of all, thank you for responding to the recent survey about PE kits. Your responses could not be any more of a landslide! Out of 89 participants (way over half of our families), **everyone** said they would be happy for children to come to school in their PE kits on PE days! We will let you know which days when we have firm timetables in place...



Regarding my other recent survey, I would like to update you on some developments within school.

You said:	We did:
You praised the community spirit of the school, some people noted it 'felt like a family' and was a 'wonderful, nurturing space'.	This will absolutely remain. The community feel of this school, in the heart of Stainland, can be felt by everyone here – children, staff and families.
Children are safe	I agree! In a recent Safeguarding Audit with Ken Inwood, Chair of Governors, we found that all children who we asked felt 'safe' and 'happy' at school. Children knew how to stay safe and what to do if they felt unsafe or worried about something.
Approximately a third of respondents were unsure of the school's values	Our recent 'wordle' was created with everyone who is invested in the school – families, children, Governors and staff. I have condensed all your amazing responses into four key values for the school:

Some comments focused on after-school clubs	While our free-to-all sports clubs were widely celebrated, some respondents wished for non-sports
arter-scrioor clubs	activities. I believe this was commonplace prior to
	COVID restrictions and, once we receive the 'go ahead'
	for some restrictions to drop further in school, we will
	attempt to restart a broad range of after-school clubs to
	suit more interests.
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Almost 25% of respondents disagreed with 'My child enjoys their school dinner'.	Upon your comments and conversations in the playground, this response is more about the availability of dinners, particularly for KS2 children. Mrs Knight and I are working closely with Lindley (our dinner providers) and we think there is a way for children to pre-select their lunch options. Watch this space – we are actively working on it!
A few respondents asked whether we could move to separate year groups to avoid mixed-age teaching	From September, we are! Of course, there are some financial considerations to this (i.e. an extra teacher) and so this 'we did' is with great thanks to our continued support from the Trust.
There was mixed response to homework – some families wanted more; some wanted less	Homework is always a contentious issue in primary schools. We are currently reviewing our homework offer for next academic year. I hope you will be impressed with our newly purchased and launched reading scheme books for Year 2 upwards. As Mrs Kinsella has communicated, we expect all children to read aloud at home to an adult at least three times per week. Building reading confidence, fluency and comprehension are key to children's later success.

I hope that you have found this update useful and you can see how we are responding to your welcomed feedback. I have shared all your positive comments with our staff team, and they are also on the school website, too.

Finally, some respondents noted many changes in leadership over the past few years, as well as disruptions due to COVID closures and lockdowns. These challenges have been recognised by school, too, and will form a key part of our development plan moving forwards. I can assure you that everyone here is hoping for increased stability and consistency over the next few years as we all work hard to develop the school and 'Achieve Together'.
