Reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC)

Dear Parents and Carers,

You may be aware from media coverage that the government has asked some schools to close or partially close due to the presence of reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC) in their school buildings. RAAC is a lightweight form of concrete; because it is weaker than regular concrete, concerns have been raised about its long-term durability. We understand that this is an unsettling news story and that it may naturally have led you to wonder about the safety of our school buildings.


We do not have any confirmed RAAC in our building and have not been asked to close any areas. During the last 18 months, we have reviewed condition surveys and spoken to our architecture and building consultancy services who have vast knowledge of our buildings and have completed a nil return for all sites to the DfE.

For information, the DfE has been helping education settings and responsible bodies (such as local authorities and multi-academy trusts) to identify and manage the potential risks of RAAC since 2018.
